
# SUNDAY BRIEFING



### Resources/Money Should Never Limit Our Service

Teaching a course in Church Administration a number of years ago, I read a book that presented the idea that one can tell the spiritual health of a church based on its' yearly budget! I was intrigued by what I read and challenged to realize that, whether the statement was 100% accurate or not, there was certainly some truth in the comment. The boldness of planning and supporting various ministry efforts is tied to our understanding of material resources and our stewardship over these. If a Church's Budget is focused only on the activity that impacts the lives of church members, one can certainly ascertain that "the lost" of our world are not part of that church's values and concern. If the Budget is highly tied to parties, activities, outings, and the like, one needs to consider whether there is clear evangelistic intent in these or not? When buildings and their development come into play, the question needs to be considered as to how the upgrading or building will benefit the Kingdom of God on a daily basis and not just on Sunday's. If the "Tithe" is 1/10 of our monthly income that we return to the Lord for His service, I would have to say that most churches should be doing well even without any further "offerings or alms" for the next level of giving. Don't misunderstand, the giving of offerings and alms is good after one returns the tithe but most churches should be able to build a budget based on the tithe alone. Of course, we have to admit that many believers are struggling with their understanding of the tithe and how it impacts the work, vision, and boldness of a church's direction. Let us pray that FCBC is able to grasp that ALL we have belongs to God and that giving back to Him, for his Church's Ministry, is "reasonable service." May we all be blessed as we develop a church known for our obedience (Ecc. 12:13) and faithfulness. May we remember that we are to be the "ginger of the dish" as we seek to be creative for reaching our lost world.



#### COMMUNITY CELEBRATES CENTENNIAL OF CUTLER PLOTKIN JEWISH HERITAGE CENTER

The Arizona Jewish Historical Society is planning three different events, starting in fall 2021, to commemorate the 100-year history of the Cutler Plotkin Jewish Heritage Center, 122 E. Culver Street, immediately adjacent to Phoenix's Margaret T. Hance Park. Recognized as a Phoenix Point of Pride, the historic building has been home to Congregation Beth Israel, which built it as the first synagogue in Phoenix in 1921; the First Chinese Baptist Church starting in 1951; Iglesia Bautista Central Church in 1981; and the Arizona Jewish Historical Society beginning in 2002.

- Gallery Centennial Exhibit--"If These Walls Could Talk" -- The Centennial exhibit will
  feature historic memorabilia, photos, narratives, garments and more, highlighting all
  four organizations that have called the building home. The exhibit opens Oct. 3, 2021
  and runs through March 31, 2022. Hours are Monday through Friday, 11 a.m. to 4 p.m.
  or by appointment. Recommended exhibit admission is \$5, or attendees can make a
  voluntary donation of their choosing. Group discounts are available for organizations.
- The Heritage Center-- Over the past 100 years, the Heritage Center has hosted countless religious, social, and cultural community events. From 1921 to 1949, the building was the home of Congregation Beth Israel, and served as a religious sanctuary, community center and gathering place for the local Jewish community. In 1951, it began new life as First Chinese Baptist Church, where it served as a religious and social hub for Phoenix's growing Chinese-American community. From 1981-2002, it was the home of a Spanish-speaking congregation, Iglesia Bautista Central. The Arizona Jewish Historical Society purchased the building in 2002 and renamed it as the Cutler☆Plotkin Jewish Heritage Center. The Society restored the building in 2009 as a museum, cultural center and event venue open to people of all backgrounds.
- **Centennial Heritage Gala--** Honoring long-time AZJHS community leader Lawrence M. Cutler. The Gala is on Saturday evening, Oct. 30, at the Scottsdale Plaza Resort, 7200 N. Scottsdale Road. Visit the Gala webpage for more information or to register online.
- Centennial Festival-- Noon to 4 pm Sunday, Nov. 7, at the Cutler
  Plotkin Jewish Heritage Center, 122 E Culver Street. The event is free and open to the community, to celebrate the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the building, the establishment of the first synagogue in Phoenix and the diverse community that has called the building home. The Centennial Exhibit will be open during the event, which also will include musical entertainment by Congregation Beth Israel, First Chinese Baptist Church, Monte Vista Cross-Cultural Church, and the Rural Street Klezmer Band; special guest speakers; food trucks; activities for children; and a photo booth.
