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### Words: "You Do You" is a challenging term

In the valley, we see billboards and commercials selling casino life as exciting and fun for the individual as the term "You Do You" presents a message. Yet, how can a person truly be so individualistic with his or her behavior that it never impacts others? Aren't we part of the same society and have responsibility toward that society and those around us with our choices and actions? At what point does "me being me" reveal insensitivity or limited disrespect for others?

America is a country where individualism is highly valued and encouraged as long as our actions and ideas don't offend, harm, or degrade others. Should our decisions or choices bring stress or challenge beyond the comfort level of another, it is there that the problems begin for us! If the "You Do You" idea includes a respect and care for the good of others, it can be healthy and sensitive. When "You Do You" implies disregard toward others or is selfish in application, it reflects the worst of our societal ambitions.

As a Christian, I too desire to be a bit individualistic and not find myself living within a Christian bubble of expectation that is sometimes highly limiting toward relationships and how I might best use my life. Many of us grew up in the church where we learned our values and goals. I tend to think that much of my individualism is modeled in the lives of Biblical disciples and even Jesus himself! To be a true Christian is not to simply memorize behavior that we think is appreciated by other Christians. Our Christian goal must be to understand the principles/values of Christ and allow those principles to guide how we treat others even when our life experiences are beyond Biblical specifics. There are many daily events in 2022 that the Bible does not directly provide guidance toward but, with the principles and standards of God, we can "Do You" in line with what the Father would approve. When the Lordship of Christ is our reality, the "Doing You" is also "Doing His Will!"
